In 2018 Eth was Awarded the New Zealand Queen's Birthday Honour of Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) for her services to administrative professional development.

Eth closed her own business and retired at the end of 2018. She is still passionate about the administrative profession. She is very keen to continue working to ensure the World Administrators Summit continues to take a leading role to support recognition of administrative work as a profession and to hear administrative professionals internationally speak with one voice.
